TasPorts 74th Maria Island Race 2021



A small but talented fleet of twelve yachts lined up in gloomy conditions for the start of the 74th TasPorts Maria Island race 2021 with light rain and drizzle testing the efficacy of crew's wet weather clothing.

The Maria Island race is one of Australia's oldest ocean races commencing only two years after the first Sydney to Hobart race in 1947.

Despite the "dour" conditions there was close and competitive racing throughout the fleet but no more so than with the three leading line honor contenders, "Jazz Player" "Kracken 42S "and "Filepro" with "nip & tuck" racing throughout the length of the 180nm race.

RO Steven Shield sent the yachts past the rugged cockscomb cliffs off Cape Raoul and Tasman Island then around Maria Island leaving the picturesque island to port with the yachts then retracing their "steps" back to Hobart.

Saturday's Combined Clubs Summer Pennant & Long Race Series race, conducted by the Bellerive Yacht Club, provided the predicted IRC and AMS scrap between Midnight Rambler (Ed Psaltis) and David Calvert's Intrigue but there was no doubting the line honours winner. Gary Smith's Fork in the Road took the finish gun by eight minutes from Peter Cretan's Tilt with Sidewinder (Rob Gough) a further 30 seconds behind.

The BYC race committee took account of the strong wind forecast and kept the courses within the river, setting race tracks that in the main kept to the western shore.

Even with that caution, there were still some retirements although gear damage is thought to be minor.

In Group 1 Midnight Rambler had a day out beating arch-rival Intrigue to win IRC and AMS divisions and picking up a handy second on PHS. Matthew Keal's Heat Wave, from the host club BYC, took third on AMS and IRC to stay in touch with the leaders at the halfway point of the season.

Fork in the Road took the Line Honours-PHS double followed by Midnight Rambler and Gary Cripps' Guilty Pleasures VI.

In weather tailor-made for the big red boat, Natelle II (Glenn Roper) beat Richard Grant's Cromarty Magellan by one second on PHS corrected time, reversing the line honours result in Group 2. Mark Ballard's 42 South did enough with a second place on AMS and a third on PHS to maintain her lead in these divisions.

Steve Chau's Small Gains holds second place on PHS and AMS and is leading the IRC division after Andrew Parker's Arunga was forced to retire from Saturday's race.

Bryan Walpole's Invincible had a challenging day in Group 3, dropping the series lead on AMS to Justin Barr's Rumbeat and seeing her IRC series lead reduced to one point over Rumbeat with Stewart Geeves' Footloose a further point behind. Footloose, a proven heavy weather performer, had a great day with wins on IRC and AMS and a second to Rumbeat on PHS. Rumbeat leads PHS by five points going into the season break.

Ian Smith and Dean Aberle's Innovator took the win in Group 4 from Steve Mannering's Camlet Way with Astrolabe (Peter Bosworth) in third. Innovator is now leading PHS on countback from Astrolabe with Camlet Way still in the hunt three points adrift.

STAFF'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Double cheese and spring vegetable tart



INGREDIENTS

500g block short crust pastry
plain flour, for dusting
25g mature cheddar, finely grated
200g asparagus spears, woody ends trimmed
100g fresh podded or frozen peas
2 eggs
100g crème fraîche
150g double cream
Whole nutmeg, for grating
100g watercress

and waterered

300g or 2 logs of soft, rindless goat's cheese

Method

Roll the pastry out into a rectangle on a work surface lightly dusted with flour. Scatter over the cheese, fold the pastry in half and roll out again into a circle that fits a 25cm tart tin with an overhang. Chill for 20 mins. Meanwhile, cook the asparagus in boiling water for 3 mins, then drain and refresh under cold water. Cook the fresh peas the same way for a minute, or simply defrost the frozen peas.

STEP 2

Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Prick the base of the tart well with a fork, line with baking parchment and fill with baking beans. Bake the tart for 30 mins, remove the parchment and beans, prick again if it has puffed up, then bake for another 10-15 mins until biscuit brown.

STEP 3

Meanwhile, beat the eggs in a bowl, add the crème fraîche and cream, season and add a pinch of freshly grated nutmeg. Scatter the peas and most of the watercress over the tart and crumble over half the goat's cheese. Pour over the creamy egg mixture, then lay the asparagus spears on top. Finally, slice the remaining goat's cheese and arrange on top, then bake for 25-30 mins until the custard is just set and the cheese is golden brown. Leave to cool in the tin, trim the edges of the pastry, then remove from the tin, scatter with the remaining watercress and serve cut into slices. Can be made up to a day ahead, leave out the fridge to keep the pastry crisp.


