

Marina staff will soon undertake a routine check across the marina to ensure 'test and tag' of all power leads has been completed.

It is a requirement that your leads must be tested and tagged (as pictured below) by an

electrician or certified person every 12 months. If your lead is identified as not meeting the minimum safety standards, we will contact you and disconnect the lead to avert safety issues.

Test and tagging must be completed by end of June 2023.

#### **MAST Powerboat Courses**

In Tasmania, a motorboat licence is required to operate a vessel 4hp or more (except for a

hire and drive vessel).

The RYCT is an accredited provider of the MAST Motor Boat Licence which is valid for a three-year period (pro-rata) and all licences have a common expiry date.

The cost is \$130 per person.

#### **PROVISIONAL COURSES**

The MAST Motor Boat Provisional licence for children 12-17 years can be offered during all courses.

The cost is \$100 for a provisional licence.

#### From the RYCT Kitchen

Every month we share with you our favourite recipes.

This month it is the ultimate pasta carbonara recipe by Tahlia Cantwell.

This quick and delicious pasta dish is sure to become a regular on your menu. Don't forget to pair it with a glass of bubbles for the ultimate mealtime indulgence.



#### **INGREDIENTS**

Extra virgin olive oil (a few generous glugs)

Good quality flaked salt

Cracked black pepper (about 1 tablespoon)

Smoked paprika (a pinch)

Mushrooms ( about 10, chopped into decent-sized chunks)

Pecorino Romano (finely grated, about 1 cup)

Cream (about 1/4 cup)

Eggs (3, but just the yolks; bonus points for duck eggs)

Prosciutto (about 100g, torn into pieces)

Pasta (something long and flat)

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

Whisk together the cream and egg yolks in a small bowl. Set aside.

In a large pot, bring salted water to a rolling boil. Add your pasta and cook until almost al dente.

Heat the olive oil in a large, heavy pan over medium heat. Add pepper, paprika, and a

generous pinch of salt. Cook until the pepper becomes fragrant.

Add the mushrooms to the pan and stir until they are coated in the oil and seasoning. Cook until they are just tender.

Take a couple of cups of pasta water from the pot and add it to the pan. Drain the pasta and add it to the pan as well. Simmer and then reduce the heat.

Create a well in the centre of the pan and gradually stir most of the pecorino into the pasta, saving some for garnish. If the sauce gets a little lumpy, don't worry - it will still taste great.

Turn off the heat and add the egg and cream mixture to the pan. Stir it in well.

Serve the finished pasta in a bowl. Top with the torn prosciutto, a sprinkling of extra pecorino, a pinch of salt flakes, and another crack of pepper.

# **CLUB NOTICES**

## MAST - Winter is here, which means cold water!

Cold water immersion is more frequently talked about these days, especially since boating is no longer just a summer pastime and people are now boating all year round. "Cold water", from research in Canada, is typically from 15 degrees or less.

Generally, these are the water temperatures in Tasmania for approximately 60% of the year. Over the last 23 years, 38 fatalities in once you are in the water, try Tasmania (or 66%) have occurred in water temperatures of 15 degrees or less. It has been well-documented that wearing a life jacket will considerably increase your chances of survival in cold water.

Professor Michael Tipton from the UK, an expert on cold water immersion, is guite clear in his advice. Don't fall in to start with. In the UK. 60% of fatalities in cold water are due to shortterm responses from the initial immersion. Professor Tipton says the most dangerous response is the loss of control of breathing in the initial seconds of immersion, which is part of the cold shock response.

Again, the quick answer to avoid cold water immersion is, of course, to not fall in! But, if you do, there are a few tips Professor Tipton recommends. MAST has written about all these previously, but a reminder never hurts, considering the number of fatalities we have had in cold water:

- wear specialised clothing as an outer layer to slow the rate of water entry to the skin
- wear a life jacket
- and stay still and float to get your breathing under control.

Once you are in the water your skin cools rapidly, and this causes a big gasp of air which can be up to 2-3 litres. The lethal dose of water in your lungs for drowning is around 1.5 litres. After that initial gasp, there can be uncontrolled hyperventilation. You don't need to be under the water for this to occur. You can be at the water's surface with waves breaking over your face and you can easily take in water at this time. It is important you protect the airway in those first few seconds. Also, during the first seconds of immersion, there is significant



stress on the heart which causes an increase in blood pressure. Professor Tipton believes that a considerable number of people have a problem because of the cardiac response in those first seconds of immersion, resulting in heart attacks.

It is vital that you rest and relax and get your breathing back under control. This is why it is imperative you wear a life jacket.

The secret is of course having the

life jacket fit snugly and using a crotch strap. A loose-fitting life jacket will have you fighting with it to stop it from floating above your head and this results in energy consumption and a loss of body heat leading to hypothermia. Whilst a good-fitting life jacket will help, so will the correct type of clothing you wear when boating in cold weather in the event you end up in the water. Just don't fall in, as the good Professor says. 😊

## Snap Hooks on tethers

The Special Regulations changing snap hook requirements have been amended and may need crews to replace equipment.

Snap hooks are an essential part of the personal protective equipment on board an offshore racing yacht. The purpose of the equipment is to work with the tether and harness to keep the crew attached to the boat.

A recent interpretation confirmed that the requirement for a snap hook at each end of the tether is exactly that; a snap hook. The interpretation confirms that snap shackles or other quick or easily released mechanisms are not compliant equipment. Whilst these other mechanisms have crept into the offshore space, the requirement that the tether have snap hooks at each end has always been the case and the interpretation only serves as a reminder. The reason why snap hooks are required is because the arrangement's purpose is keeping crew attached to the boat and not be left astern at sea.

The amendment to the Special Regulations concerning snap hooks and tethers was published in November 2021. The change is that after 1 July 2023 flat plate snap hooks won't be permitted and that they must be of the variety that has side-wall support. This means that some crews will need to replace some tethers, depending what they are carrying on board.



The reason for the change is important. Incident reports demonstrated that flat plate snap hooks will deform under certain loads and detach. The snap hooks are excellent under a drop test resulting in a straight line shock, but yacht racing in strong winds and a decent sea state doesn't offer such controlled conditions, and in November 2017 a sailor went overboard while at the bow assisting with a headsail change and lost their life. The most obvious contributing factor was the failure of their snap hook.



There have been articles published on websites shining a spotlight on this important and sometimes fatal safety issue:

Australian Sailing is currently working with Standards Australia, and through them the International Standards Organisation to see standards concerning safety lines, tethers and snap hooks reviewed and changed to reflect the position taken in the Special Regulations.
